1:30pm to 2:15pm	<p><b>The Walking Dead, Inc.: Combating the Invasion of Zombie Companies and How They Eat Your Profits - Brit Treadway, Principal, TransUnion Solution Consulting Group</b></p> <p>With the emergence of the “Zombie genre” across countries and cultures, it should come as no surprise that “Zombie businesses” are becoming a problem for carriers as well – both in the United States and globally. What is a Zombie business and why should anyone care? Broadly defined, a Zombie firm is a company whose profits are not enough to cover the interest service on their loans. 16% of U.S. firms (12% globally) fall under the definition of a Zombie business, whereas in the early 1990’s the Zombie rate was only 2%. To a great extent, this growth has been driven by leveraged loans and lower interest rate availability – which in turn have propped up companies that probably should</p>



	never have continued to be in business. There is a mounting need to understand, identify and protect oneself when working with and evaluating these companies – particularly smaller companies that may have even less rigor and stability.
